Character traits

What Are Character Traits?



Before we begin, I want you to take time to think about your friends, family members, neighbours, or just anyone who you meet on a regular basis. Without thinking about their physical appearance, how would you describe them to someone else? Are these people funny? Sincere? Sneaky? Stubborn?

These are just a few descriptive adjectives used to describe someone's personality, and that is exactly what character traits are. They are words used to describe how characters act during certain situations or what kind of people they are. Character traits are sometimes described as good or bad, and everyone has them. You can even identify character traits in characters you see in movies, TV shows, and books!

(Know that there is something suspicious happening)












Similes

A simile is a type of idiom. It likens one thing to another thing.

As strong as an ox

(about a person with great strength)





As light as a feather *(when something weighs very little)*

As busy as a bee (about a person who is working a lot)





As quiet as a mouse

(someone who is shy and untalkative;

someone who is being quiet so as not to be heard)

As white as a sheet

(when someone's face is white due to fear)





As black as night

(when something is very black or dark)

To eat like a horse

(to describe someone who always has a big appetite)
